

- Majors/ minors/ special programs (flexibility)
- Student to faculty ratio
- Class size/type of learner
- Dominating fields
- Curriculum
- Undergrad vs graduate school

- Need-based vs. Need-blind
- Aid to international students (tend to be a lower tier)

Step 3: Determine your tier

• Rankings:

- US news
- \circ Forbes
- Times Higher Education
- SAT Scores & GPA calculator
- Don't stress over rankings!!!

Step 4: Do your research

Where resources come from:

- School websites
- Virtual tours
- Information sessions
- College confidential, Quora, Youtube, Reddit, Unigo etc.
- Upperclassmen/Alumni
- When your results come out- visit if you can
- Books: Fiske Guide, Princeton Review, College Match

-> Rate your school on the factors you consider

Step 5: Split your remaining schools

- Determine your EA/ ED/ REA schools
 - EA: Early Action
 - ED: Early Decision
 - REA: Restricted Early Action
 - RD: Regular Decision
- The remaining will be RD schools- in general, you should have 10-12 (counting the UCs as one)
- 3-4 in safety, match, and reach each

Early Action

- Apply early.
- Receive an admission decision early in the admission cycle (usually in January or February).
- Consider acceptance offer; do not have to commit upon receipt.
- Apply to other colleges under regular admission plans.
- Give the college a decision no later than the May 1 national response date.

Early Decision

- Apply early (usually in November) to firstchoice college.
- Receive an admission decision from the college well in advance (usually by December).
- Agree to attend the college if accepted and offered an adequate financial aid package.
- Apply to **only one college** early decision.
- Withdraw all other applications if accepted by ED.
- Send nonrefundable deposit well before 5/1.

Application Systems

- Common Application / Coalition Application
- University of California & University of Texas uses their own system
- Biggest difference is essay



GPA & Courses

- Know the rules!
 - Course design when choosing "類組"
 - 100 scale to 4.0 scale conversion
 - Ranking Weighted vs Unweighted
- Submit the transcript with better stats
- Other tips:
 - Talk to teachers
 - Maximize efficiency

GPA & Courses

Weighted

- Takes into account how difficult the course is
- Some colleges add 0.5 or 1 to AP & honor classes

Unweighted


Out of 4.0

Standardized Testing

• SAT vs. ACT

- SAT is more about your critical thinking while ACT is more about speed
- \circ $\,$ Try both practice tests and decide which one to take
- TOEFL/ other language tests
- SAT II (subject test)
 - Usually two subjects
- SAT I Essay
 - Usually optional

Recommendation Letter

- Ask around **May** for a recommendation letter
- Ask for one in humanities, and one in STEM
- Ask in person
- You are legally not allowed to read it
- Be polite!

 - Put down the ones that matter most
 - 150 characters per extracurricular
 - Use numbers, short phrases, and action words
- List out the time invested per week

Extracurriculars Planning Tips

- A good extracurricular makes you stand out:
 - Leadership
 - Impact
 - Teamwork
- Connects to your core values
- Huge impact >> long-term >> short-term
- Plan one year ahead

Essays

- Most schools require a personal statement + 1-5 supplemental essays.
- Personal statement: choose 1 out of 7 prompts (650 words)
- **Supplemental Essays** (around 100-400 words)
- Essays are the best way to show admissions officers who you are as a person, so DON'T just show what you've done.



BEYOND TAIWAN

Essays- Common Supplemental Questions

- Why did you choose this school? How will the school help you grow?
- Why did you choose this major? What particular skill do you have for this major?
- Tell a story/person who made a difference in your life.
- Reflect on your interactions with your community and what role you play in it?
- What is a social problem/issue that you care deeply about?
- How will you show your leadership at _____?

Interviews- Colleges

- Mostly offered by T10 schools/ivy leagues
- Recommended but not required
- Held by school alumni
- A casual chat about yourself
- A great chance to learn more about the schools

Interviews- 3rd Parties



- Accepted by most of the colleges
- Additional way to demonstrate English proficiency
- Strengthen profile if didn't do well on TOEFL or IELTS
- NOT required

Portfolio

- Art portfolio
 - \circ Works
 - \circ Descriptions
 - Art statement
- Dance portfolio
- Writing portfolio
- Research portfolio

10-15 colleges (usually)

Factors to consider:

- ED vs. RD vs. EA vs. REA
- Rankings (tier)
- COST (financial aid, work-study, etc.)
- Location
- Academics
- Extracurriculars


